
MEMBERSHIP DUES DUE!!

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MONSTER TOWER

"monster" Two so-called towers are now in service at Walnut Grove penetrating the atmosphere with high powered RF from an elevation of 2,000 feet. KTXL, TV 40 is now broadcasting from their new tower, which is the se-cond 2,000 footer in service for Sacramento television stations. Channel 3, KCRA, has been operating from their new 2K tower for several months. Side mounted on the channel 3 tower at the 1800 foot level is the channel 31 UHF antenna. Both 31 and 40 are operating at the maximum power of 5 million watts ERP.

In related television news, channel 64 is scheduled on the air in the near future in Stockton with their transmitter located on Mt. Diablo. They will be running a 60 KW transmitter built by Sainte in Modesto for an ERP of 5 megawatts. Channel 27, owned by Chester Smith (KCSO Modesto) is scheduled on the air shortly on Slide Mountain at 10,000 feet overlooking Reno and Lake Tahoe. The station is licensed to Reno and will carry the Spanish International Network. Channel 28 is in the building stage

for Chico/Redding and channel 49 owned by the Roman
Catholic Diocese of Fresno
will be coming on the air
from Blue Ridge Mountain
behind Visalia. The city of
license is Visalia. Sainte
transmitters will be used by
these stations.

According to Sainte engineer George, K1TKJ, RCA Corporation has stopped building television transmitters and cameras. This moves Sainte up to number four in the television transmitter building business. Their plant is located on Carpenter road in Modesto.

PERIMETER SYSTEMS

A Canadian company has developed a very effective detection system consisting of a pair of cables placed beneath the surface which can pick up body objects passing over them. These systems work best at the 50-88 mHz range which could interfere with the 6 meter Amateur band, TV channels 2-6, radio astronomy and navigation at the 72-76 mHz. a result, the FCC has introduced a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, General Docket 85- 231 . (ARRL)

MEXICAN AMATEUR PERMITS

Documentary evidence year, a new Packet Digipeter exists which indicates that Mexico is approving temporary Amateur radio licenses to American Amateurs. The engineer-in-charge of Permits and Concessions of the Secretariat of Communicais sponsored by the Tele- tions and Transport in Chihuahua confirmed that he has been authorized to give a temporary Mexican call sign from amono those des-tined for Chihuahua State to U.S. visitors to Mexico.

The November meeting of SARA was called to 1933 by Club President Lercy, NV6S. Introductions of members and guests followed. The minutes of the September and October meetings were read and approved as read by Secretary Denny, WG6P. Break for refreshments. Raffle prize of \$18.00 cash was won by NV6S. WA6OYF, Stanislaus County Emergency Coordinator reported that there are two upcoming disaster drills. The first on Saturday November 30th and the second on December 13. Volunteers can contact Allen to volunteer.



Discussion followed regarding the linking of the 220 and 2 meter machines. It was decided the two machines should only be linked during the Thursday night net and when using the autopatch or calling another station on two meters. AFS reported that the 220 machine had been giving the technical crew considerable trouble. It has been up and down several times in the last six weeks because of it jumping off frequency. No one specific problem has been found, but several small ones have been corrected. The meeting was adjourned at 933 p.m. Respectfully submitted by Denny, WG6P, SARA Secretary.

VE TEST FEE INCREASED

Effective January 1, 1986, the fee to take a Volunter Examination from ARRL accredited examiners will increase from \$4.00 to \$4.25. The FCC allows \$4.29 (as of the January 1, 1986), but the League has set their fee at \$4.25 per candidate. The ARRL/VEC coordinates test sessions in all fifty states plus many locations overseas. Send an s.a.s.e. to Hq for an updated printout of upcoming tests in your area.


In a related matter, the FCC lifted the thirty day waiting period for candidates who fail a test. The commission now requires that a candidate being retested not take exactly the same test that was failed previously. FCC also directs that the VE teams have the right not to retest anyone at the same session. Under the ARRL/VEC procedure, a candidate who fails may not be retested at the same test session. Once the candidate fails a written element, his or her participation at that session has ended. Subsequent retesting will occur only when the candidate submits a new Form 610 application and pays another \$4.25 test fee. SARA operates under the auspices of the ARRL program.

October Amateur licensing statistics: New first time Amateurs 1,356 compared to 961 in October 1984. Novice upgrades, 822. Technician upgrades, 319. General upgrades, 355. Advanced upgrades, 213 compared to 58 a year

ago. Total number of licensed U.S. Amateurs as of October 1985, 413,127. Average age of all Amateurs 56.14 years. Youngest licensed Amateur is 7 and the oldest is 98.

ULTRASONIC PEST CONTROL

Ultrasonic pest control devices are advertised to repel pests (i.e., mice, etc.) roaches, rates, roaches, etc.) through the emission of acoustic noise that cannot be heard by people. devices have been found to cause electromagnetic interference to televisions, as well as other types of equipment. Frequencies at which interference has been reported range from 20 to 470 mHz. Though pest control devices are not normally subject to FCC controls, however, ultrasonic devices of this type are subject to the technical and noninterference requirements of the FCC rules. FCC staff have determined that a minor technical change to these devices would substantially reduce their electromagnetic emissions, hence interreducing their RF fernce potential. (ARRL Letter)

Report and Order in PR Docket 84 FCC non-government radio location has been given primary status 1900 to 2000 kHz. This relates to the projected allocation of 1605 to 1705 kHz to broadcasting which will radio determination stations in that Effective December 9, 1985 Amateur stations in the 1900 $2000~{\rm kHz}$ must not cause harmful interference tradiolocation service and are afforded no protection interference arising from radiolocation operations. FCC will not accept applications from radiolocation stations desiring to move from 1605-1705 to 1900-2000 kHz until July 1987, Amateurs will continue to have exclusive non-government use of this band until private radio location transmitters become operational. Further details can be found in Jan. 1986, QST.

Propagation forecast bulletins indicate the end of Cycle 21 will occur in June of 1987.

Starting January 1, 1986, the fee for ARRL/VEC Amateur examinations will be \$4.25. FCC will allow a fee of \$4.29 due to inflation. ARRL/VEC has rounded this number to the nearest quarter.

Since FCC eliminated the 30 day wait before retaking a failed exam element, some modifications have been released. A candidate being retested may not take exactly the same test that was failed previously. FCC also says that VE teams have the right NOT to retest anyone at the session. Under the ARRL/VEC Amateur exams, a candidate may not be retested at the same session. When a candidate fails a written exam element, his or her participation in the exam session is over. He can be retested at a subsequent session and must file a new Form 610 and submit an additional test fee. Remember this is for Amateur Exams under the ARRL/VEC. Other VECs may have other procedures for their VE teams to follow.
