Modesto, CA. 95355. SARA owns and operates two F.M. repeaters. 145.39 MHz (-) located on Mt. Dso, 22 miles SW of Modesto at an elevation of 3,370 feet. Our 220 MHz repeater operates on 223.68 MHz (-) and is also located on Mt. Dso at an elevation of 3,500 feet. Both repeaters are equipped with an autopatch for the use of SARA members. SARA owns and operates a Packet Digipeater, W6EJF-1, also located on Mt. Dso at 3,500 feet. Frequency is 145.01 MHz. SARA conducts an informational net on both repeaters each Thursday evening at 800 pm with the exception of holidays. SARA meets the third Tuesday of each month at the Stanislaus County Administration building at the corner of 12th and H streets in downtown Modesto. Meetings begin at 730 pm. SARA is incorporated in the State of California, is an affiliated club of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) and Stanislaus County RACES. Dues are \$20.00 per annum and \$10.00 for students up to sophomores in college. Dues are pro-rated for newly joining members from the date they join. ARRL memberships and DST renewals may be made through the club with a \$2.00 commission retained by SARA.

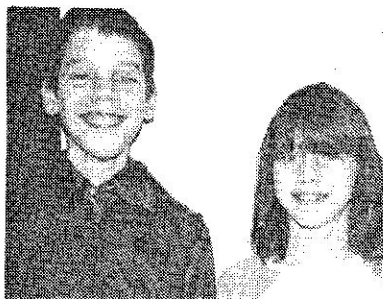

The fine was \$1,450. The jamming occurred on the 40 meter band when UWH retransmitted voice recordings of another Amateur station and jammed the frequency. On a related matter, perennial offender K6DYD (Extra) of Ocean Beach, CA. has pleaded guilty to intentionally jamming the San Diego FBI radio network last year. He was fined \$1,000 and placed on three years (FCC

supervised) probation. DYD must perform five years of community service which he will do by providing and maintaining a repeater radio system for the San Diego YMCA. The sentence was very unusual in that it sets up the FCC as a probation officer in order to supervise the community service requirements of the fine. +++ Got a nice note in the mail from Oakie Clark, K6SJV, of Forest Grove, Or. Oakie says he's getting along fine and he has finally got his antennas up. Thanks for the cartoon Oakie, only wish I could use it. HI HI. +++ I'm still unable to print the February meeting minutes as they have not been received from the Secretary. 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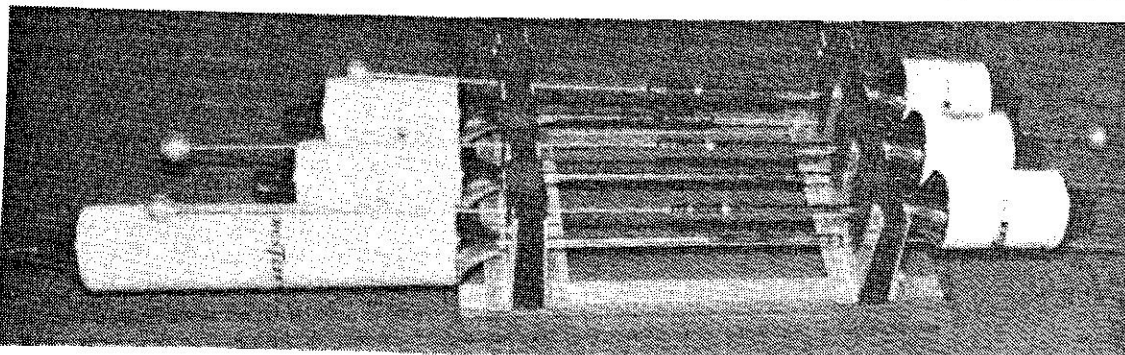
## 75 -10 METERS SUPER MOBILE RESONATORS

Operating low bands from the mobile is a lot of fun. I use a Kenwood TS440-S with the antenna tuner and a set of super resonators. With the antenna tuner and the super resonators, I can QSY quickly to a frequency that is out of resonance and be tuned up in a jiffy. Because of the size of the resonators, I was forced to put them outside the cab of my truck which was OK because I wanted them as near the antenna as possible. I was looking for a way to keep them from rolling around in the bed of the pickup and possibly causing damage.

So, I started looking around for ideas. I had bought a set of fishing rod holders for my boat and while looking at them I felt they would do the job. I used 3 fishing pole holders and two 12 inch long adjustable metal shelf bracket holders



as mounts for the resonator. I used the shelving bracket holders because I had them handy. Any piece of flat metal will do. I fastened the fishing pole holders together using the holes already there. Then I put the 75, 40 and 20 meter resonator in first, with the stingers all facing the same way. Then I put the 15, 11 and 10 meter stingers on the other side facing them toward the bottom resonators and on top of their stingers. This seems to be working very well. I can always carry them into the house whenever I want and can handle and it works very well. You could fasten them down in the trunk of a car or someplace in a R.V. if that's what your using. Looks to me like it would work laying down or up on it's side. (Continued on page 15)

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# On The Agenda.

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The March 15, 1988 meeting of SARA was called to order at 7:33 pm by President Bud, N6OCV. Introduction of 21 members and visitors followed. The treasurer's report was given by N6OCS. Starting balance, \$2306.83. Three deposits for \$262.00. Expenses: NV6S \$42.24 for repeater building. KI6YQ \$16.01 for stationary. Budget Copy \$50.56 for the READOUT. Pacific Bell \$20.04 for the autopatch phone. Postmaster \$100 for READOUT postage for 4 months. WA6ZLD for miscellaneous supplies for the newsletter. Report approved as read. LaVerne, KB6ECF suggested that a decision should be made ASAP as to whether or not the club was going to participate in Field Day or opt for another mini DXpedition. You can call her at 578-5554 Sunday and Monday and let her know your preference. Bud, N6OCV, reported that he had talked to the Turlock ARC regarding the cost of their liability insurance. It cost them about \$400 through the ARRL program. Bud said he called the ARRL and they are going to be sending him information on the subject. DCV announced that VP WA6DHP has been

checking with the former engineer of the system on Mt. Oso that is interfering with our 2 meter repeater. The suggestion was made that it is time we take them up on their offer to share the expense of installing a cavity on their transmitter to further reduce their second harmonic. The pros and cons were again discussed concerning the fireworks stand as a money making project this summer. Those that worked diligently on the project last year will be contacted again to see if anything has progressed as far as locating a site. Steve, N6EKV, reported that we need to renew our membership in NARCC (Northern Amateur Relay Council of California) the official frequency coordinator for this area of California. A check for \$20.00 was issued. EKV also reported that his wife Lori, N6JTD, would be willing to chair the next dinner-dance if requested. The offer was gratefully accepted and the date of October 15, 1988 set. The site will be the Oasis Restaurant on McHenry Ave. membership for this year and suggested that the Secretary should send them a

nice reminder letter. W6REC from Lodi was present at the meeting and announced that he is collecting data on a future article he is writing. He asked everyone to take a Novice written test, after which he explained that his article will concern the fact that there are some ambiguous questions and some ridiculous questions presently contained in the Novice pool. Only two people who took the test passed the test which proved his point. Bill, WB6SHE, won the raffle and the meeting was adjourned at approximately 930 pm. Respectfully submitted for the Secretary by LaVerne, KB6ECF.

Although filed 6 months after the filing deadline, the FCC, as expected, accepted the comments filed by the United Parcel Service, UPS, requesting reallocations of the 220-222 MHz Amateur band to Land Mobile Service. The ARRL filed a motion against the acceptance to no avail. The FCC in accepting the late filing, said that the proposal provided new and relevant information and for that reason accepted it. The FCC accepted a request from the ARRL to accept reply comments to the UPS filing until March 31. It's expected that the FCC will make their final ruling on this issue before long and it's starting to look like we are going to lose the bottom 2 MHz of the band.

# DX NOTEBOOK

DX is happening! Welcome to the second column and I hope this finds everyone ready for the spring DX season with no flat amplifier or kinks in the coax. Please note W66P's DX net has been changed to Wednesday nights at 2000.

Looks very favorable that the KH1, (Baker/Howell Island) Dxpedition will occur. Also, that KH5, (Kingman Reef) will be activated for a period in April is welcome news to the DX community and the west coast in particular, as conditions will favor us for snagging this exotic one.

A61AB was manned by Jacques Calvo, (Jacky) F2CW/7J1ADX, on CW for a period at the first of March. I sure hope you got this one. The station's regular operator is active with his Austrian QSL manager many mornings from 1500Z on at 14.240. Also active these days is T5GG with a weak to poor signal most days. Try 14.226 or 14.183 around 2000Z. Good luck, this is a tough one! Also, Amir, 4X6TT, continues his island hopping adventure through all of Oceania, giving us all a chance at some good DX easily workable from the west coast. He handles pileups well, working a broad split. Aruba, (P4) has been active

on many bands and remember it counts as a new country now. To be granted credit however, once ARRL begins accepting submittals, you will have to send along a PJ (Netherlands Antilles) QSL along with the Aruba card to get the credit. Spring conditions will see 20 meters open into the mid evening and later with the JA/Pacific and VK/ZL activity increasing. Good openings on that band continue after sunrise to Europe and increasing long path openings will be occurring with your beams to the west and southwest from 1400Z on. 10 and 15 meters will continue to show signs of life for DXing with European, then Orient, then South America an openings from 1700z on through the day. The openings on 10 of course are spot tier than 15, but they can be dynamite for the for the guys who scan that band and catch them. With the advent of ten meter novice phone privileges, more ears are on that band and surprisingly good paths are being reported. For those who are beginning in the DX world, nets are not a bad way to get a start. Though distasteful to some, they



enable the guy with a moderate station to work some rare stuff without going head to head with the big guns. Try 14.- 313, 14.236, 14.183, and 14.160, making sure of course that your license allows operation on these QRGS. Don't forget the International DX Convention in Visalia at the end of April. It's a blast! Good DXing to all and please send me any DX items you would like to see covered in this column. Tnx and 73 DE Tom, WJ60 and Denny, WG6P.

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CANADA TO OK NO-CODE LICENSE  
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The Canadian Department of Communications (DOC) has officially announced that it is committed to an entry level no-code Amateur license. Canada's two Amateur radio organizations, CARF and the CRRL had submitted a joint position paper to the DOC supporting an entry level ham ticket with a Morse code requirement during mid-1986. The action is deemed very significant to the USA since the two nations often act in concert. If implemented, look for the change in mid-1989.

As a reminder, Amateurs traveling to VE land (Canada) are reminded that the U.S. has automatic reciprocity with Canada. All that is necessary for operation north of the border will be your original license. US amateurs visiting Canada must use the VE 1 through 8 identifier, such as NU0X/VE2, when visiting Quebec. If you are planning a trip to a foreign country other than Canada, and are interested in the possibility of operating there, you can obtain information sheets, which in most cases contain application forms, from the Regulatory Information Branch ARRL HQ. Most countries require a minimum of 4-6 week lead time for processing of reciprocal permit requests, so consider this when making the request. Be sure to include a SASE with one unit of First Class postage for every three countries on which you desire reciprocal licensing information.

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## THOMAS ALVA EDISON AS A TELEGRAPHER

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Thomas Alva Edison, the prolific inventor, as almost everybody knows, was a Morse telegrapher in his early years. But even then he displayed real imagination and inventiveness. On one slow railroad wayside telegraph office job he was required to send an identification signal to the dispatcher every hour. So that he could devote his attention to more interesting things, Edison devised a clock mechanism which would transmit the signal automatically. It worked perfectly! But the dispatcher claims he found Edison asleep on an inspection tour and fired him. On another occasion, a flooding river separated a town in which Edison worked. It washed out the railroad bridge and all communications. Edison climbed into the cab of a stalled locomotive and using the steam whistle began signalling in Morse code, calling a telegraph operator in across the river who caught on quickly and commandeered a locomotive for his response. Two-way emergency communications were established perhaps for the first time using Morse code via steam whistles.

Edison eventually graduated into operating in a large telegraph office. He was a notably slow hand sender, but a real top notch receiver. On his first day at the office the Chief Operator wanted to see how good Edison was and at the same time probably provide some laughs for the old-timers in the office. He assigned Edison to the "hottest" wire in the office, manned by a high-speed artist at the other end of the circuit. He started sending to Edison at a moderate rate of speed, then kept increasing it until the wire almost smoked. A crowd gathered around Edison to watch the performance. Finally, exasperated because Edison had not once "broken" him to ask for a repeat, he said, "Hey, are you really copying all of this?" Edison, with a telegraphic yawn replied, "oh yes. Why don't you try sending with the other foot for awhile!" The crowd cheered and clapped in recognition of Edison's skill.

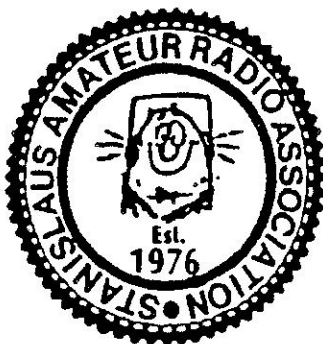
HEAVENLY

The FCC has decided to accept comments filed by United Parcel Service in Docket 87-14, the proposal to reallocate 220-222 MHz to the Land Mobile Service. The UPS proposal is for a nationwide private land mobile system in the 220-222 MHz band. Even though the comments were 6 months late, the FCC accepted them because they provide new and relevant information, and the input will be used to develop as complete a record as possible. The ARRL requested and the FCC granted a motion to allow reply comments until March 31. One of the arguments used by the ARRL in opposition to the acceptance of the UPS comments was that since all deadlines had passed, no interested party could file comments in reply to the UPS comments.

The ARRL DX Advisory Committee (DXAC) has decided that the addition of Western Sahara, SØ, will *not* be a brand new country, but a reactivation of Rio de Oro (Spanish Sahara). Thus Rio de Oro will be removed from the deleted country list and returned to the active list. Amateurs who had credit Rio de Oro will have credit for Western Sahara. The mechanism for getting this credit will be announced at some future date. QSL cards for SØRASD may be submitted for DXCC credit after June 1, 1988. See the April 1988 QST for the recent changes that have been made in the DXCC program.

Amateurs planning to travel to Canada are reminded that there is automatic reciprocity with Canada. You need to take your *original* license with you. If you are planning a trip to a foreign country other than Canada, and are interested in operating there, you can get information sheets from the Regulatory Information Branch at ARRL HQ. Most countries require a minimum of four to six weeks for processing reciprocal operating permit requests. If you write to ARRL for information, please include a SASE with 1 unit of First Class postage for every three countries on which you request reciprocal operation information.

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## NEW CALIFORNIA STATE TRAFFIC LAWS TOUGH ON FREEWAY VIOLENCE

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Have you ever yearned for another copy of those nice looking California license plates with your call sign on them? Well, if you are willing to shell out an additional one time charge of \$35, you can get a third plate. A new California state law enables owners of personalized plates (Amateur or environmental) to purchase a third plate to display or keep as a souvenir. Unlawful use of the plate is a misdemeanor, so be careful how you display it. Another new law is designed to prevent grid-lock (traffic jams at intersections). It prohibits a motorist from entering an intersection or marked crosswalk unless there is sufficient space on the otherside for his/her vehicle to clear the intersection without obstructing cross traffic. A violation of this section can carry a fine of \$50 to \$100 on the first or second offense and from \$250 to \$500 on the third or subsequent offenses. Animals can no longer be transported in an open truck bed or other area intended for cargo unless the animal is caged or cross-tethered and the space is

enclosed or has side and tail racks at least 46 inches from the floor. The law exempts livestock and working dogs used in ranching or farming. Several changes have been enacted into law as a result of the epidemic of freeway violence that erupted last summer. As of September, 1987, a vehicle used in a highway assault can be forfeited and sold. The penalty for a person convicted of discharging a firearm at an occupied motor vehicle which results in injury or death has been increased an additional 5 years. It is now a misdemeanor just to brandish a firearm at an occupied vehicle, even if the firearm is a toy gun, if it causes the occupants fear or apprehension. The law also prohibits the granting of probation to a person convicted of causing injury or death by discharging a firearm from or at an occupied motor vehicle. In addition to these new laws, the Legislature has authorized the CHP to hire another 150 officers and 30 additional support personnel to be assigned to the state problem areas.

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75 -10 METERS SUPER MOBILE RESONATORS (Cont. from Page 5)  
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By the way, the antenna is 54 inches long and is mounted rear bumper of my pickup with a ball mount. The resonators are mounted on a 54" foldover mast which comes in handy whenever entering the garage or low clearance areas. I also used a short length of fishing line (40 pound test) to help keep the mast vertical whenever using the larger resonators.

Here are the SWR and bandwidth figures on my installation.

3.755 MHz-	3.780 MHz	Under 2-1	Bandwidth 25 KHz
7.170	7.245	Under 2-1	75 KHz
14.150	14.350	Under 2-1	200 KHz
21.100	21.450	Under 1.5-1	450 KHz
28.000	28.800	Under 2-1	800 KHz

Just a little hint for tuning the resonators. To lower your operating frequency, you lengthen the stinger. Lower=Leng-then! That's an easy way to remember. Also, you might use a thin point laundry market to set different operating frequencies. I've operated on all but 20 meters with great results. I don't operate on 20 , but I guess it would work well there too. Good Luck!
