## **No-Code Technician License**

The testing requirements for the code-free Technician class license consists of two examination elements. The current 30 question Element 2 and the current 25 question Element 3(A). The total of 55 multiple choice questions are selected from a bank of approximately 550 possible questions.

All of the verbatim questions and multiple choice answers are known and widely published. The two examinations may be taken at one sitting, or broken down into two smaller segments. You do not have to pass both test elements at the same time. You will receive a credit certificate for the portion passed.

Study material is available nearly everywhere, including from our educational committee. Contact Phil Hartz, WD0FFX at 544-8515. For testing procedures and information regarding the no-code Technician, contact Chet Jensen, W6XK at 883-2968.

The ARRL/VEC allows its VE teams to accept test credit from Novice Testing Teams. For example, an applicant may take the Novice written exam (Element 2) from a 2-member Novice test team and then take the Technician written exam (Element 3A) from a VEC-sponsored team. The applicant will receive a new Technician license. The applicant will be required to bring the original and a photocopy of the completed 610 form showing credit for Element 2 to the VECsponsored team administering Element 3A

. An exception to this rule is the Sunnyvale VEC. If an applicant attends a test session sponsored by the Sunnyvale VEC (for example, Stockton or Fresno), you may request Novice test team credit ONLY if one of the Novice test team examiners is accredited by the Sunnyvale VEC.

This procedure DOES NOT apply to ARRL/VEC sponsored sessions (such as Modesto, Merced, Turlock, or Sonora).

Finally, if a no-code Technician licensee wishes to obtain HF privileges, he or she must take the 5 wpm code test from a VEC-sponsored test team NOT a Novice test team.

The rationale for this FCC requirement is because a VECsponsored team is the only entity that can issue a Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCE) proving the additional operating privileges.

• Amateur call signs issued by the FCC as of March 1, 1991 in the sixth call district; Extra's- AB6BI; Advanced- KK6XE; Generals, Technicians and Novices-KC6SFQ.

• Welcome to new SARA member Loren Cannon, K7LC, of Manteca. Loren is an Extra and a road driver for Roadway Express in Sacramento.

• The 80 meter Novice portion of the ban officially moved to 3.675-3.725 Mhz on March 16, 1991. The 3.725-3.750 MHz segment continues to be available to Generals and above for CW, RTTY and digital modes only. Phone operation is prohibited in the 3.725-3.750 MHz segment.

• Speaking of things to do this summer, the Reno Hamfest is August 3, 1991 and the SIERA ARC hamfest and computer fair will be held Oct. 12, 1991 in Minden, Nv. The Foothills College swap-meet is held every Saturday through September at the college in Los Altos. The Livermore Swap-meet is the first Sunday of each month at Las Positas College in Livermore from 7 am to 12 noon.

• Next time you fly be careful with any electronic toys you decide to take along. A portable cellular phone in luggage aboard a jetliner tripped the aircraft's smoke alarm, which caused the pilot to land at the nearest airport. The phone was found in the on position and it was some how activated in flight. When packing portable electronic gear to take along, make sure the on/off switch is securely in the off position. Detaching the battery packs would be a sure fire way to prevent accidents

Don't try to use any device that transmits a signal on board. The FAA has strict rules against that and you may find yourself in a world of hurt if you don't follow the rules. Possible interference to the plane's navigational equipment is the reason. In addition, you will no doubt get the once over from the metal detectors at the gate and a probable delay while you get pulled off to the slde for a search of your luggage.

• Remember WB2PTI? Michael Harrison was the ham radio operator who scammed many fellow hams throughout the county and abroad. He placed ads in various Amateur publications offering Amateur equipment at unbelievable prices. Harrison put the money in his pocket and never delivered any of the promised equipment. He was arrested by Federal Postal Inspectors and convicted in Federal Court in New York State. He was sentenced to 21 months in prison and fined \$125,000 and ordered to make restitution. Because of this felony conviction, the FCC has revoked his Amateur license. The rules make felons unqualified for an FCC license.

• Another SARA member has joined the Packet ranks. Welcome to Marilyn, NQ6H, of Ripon. She has an MFJ TNC.

• It looks like the last day that Amateurs can operate in the 220-222 MHz section of the 220 band will be July 31, 1991. This is not definite, but it appears that the FCC would like to have us out of there effective August 1, 1991. 222 to 225 MHz will be the new exclusively Amateur portion of the band.

• Sandwiched between rain clouds, the Transmitter-Hunt held on April 20, 1991 was enjoyed by all. Unfortunately, only a handful of hunters turned out. 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# **SARA April Minutes**

The April 16, 1991 meeting of SARA was called to order by President, Oliver Borns, KJ6YZ, at 7:33 pm. Thirty-four regular members and visitors were present. Oliver introduced Mr. Jim Martin, Deputy Director of The Office of Emergency Services for Stanislaus County. He spoke of the practice drill scheduled for April 25th, 1991, at 1:30 P.M.

He mentioned the importance of Amateur radio in augmenting government facilities during emergencies. Because, Amateur radio is an integral part of the service provided to the community by The OES. He said seven of the nine cities in the County will participate in this exercise that is the first in five years. It should be concluded by 3:30 or 4:00 PM after which a critique will take place.

Stanislaus County ARRL Emergency Coordinator, Allen Woods, WA6OYF, was introduced and gave a short presentation describing some specific activities Amateurs will be involved in. Ernie, K6UVI volunteered to coordinate drill assignments for members of SARA.

The treasurer's report was given by AI, N6SAE. The General Fund shows a present balance of \$1,375.61 after 8 debits of \$1,103.11 and 3 credits of \$392.25. The Fund Raiser Account shows a balance of \$471.07 after 1 debit to the General Fund for \$285.50 and 1 credit for \$27.00. The Education Account shows a balance of \$739.13 after no debits and 1 credit of \$67.36. The report was accepted.

The minutes of the March meeting were approved as printed in The READOUT. Vice President, Dave, N6YHZ, asked for Field Day volunteers. So far only Technician class operators had expressed an interest. Higher license classes are needed. Field Day is to take place on June29th and 30th. The fund raiser raffle winner will be drawn during Field Day. The new Spectrum repeater is up on the hill and operating. The ten meter digi replacement antenna was purchased and will be installed shortly. The new 440 duplexers and machine are up and working. Within 2-3 weeks the autopatch should be repaired as should the rest of the equipment.

Jim Shea, KB5FB, presented the club's raffle tickets that he designed and printed. He donated his labor and printing costs to the club. Raffle tickets were available to members attending the meeting with the balance of members receiving their's by mail. Sales will begin immediately with AI, N6SAE in charge of the raffle tickets. Under old business, verbal thanks was expressed to those members who participated in and provided communication for the bike-a-thon held on April 13th.

Following the break at 8:27 PM, there was a short discussion of the club station and the contract with Downey High School that comes up for renewal shortly. Since Phil, WD0FFX negotiated the original contact and it was suggested that he do so again. Under new business, a letter of thanks was read from the staff chaplain of Desert Storm thanking club members for their support for the troops during their recent Iraqi war.

Jim, N6KMR, mentioned the upcoming transmitter hunt to take place on April 20th. Participation in manning the firework's stands again this year as a fund raiser was mentioned. Steve, N6EKV, is to help coordinate the manpower requirements. Linda, N6REB has asked to be relieved of her duties as club Secretary because of illness in her family. Ernie, K6UVI volunteered to complete her term and was appointed by the President to do so. The meeting adjourned at 908 pm.

ledging you're there. Another new ham feels unwelcome. Why not say hi? Invite them to the next club meeting. You don't have to exchange life stories, just say hi. Chances are that new ham is nervous and doesn't want to talk too long anyway. Now for my big pet peeve. Closed repeaters. Here in Southern California it is very difficult to find an open repeater. Almost impossible to find one that has wide area coverage.

I'm getting extremely tired of people telling me I can't use a particular frequency. "Sorry members only." "Well how do I become a member?" "You contact WX6XXX, and if he approves of you he can nominate you for membership." "And if he doesn't like me?" "Then you can't use this repeater." This is very close to the conversation I had with another ham on a 440 system here locally. Is this right? Isn't my Extra Class license good for all frequencies in the Amateur service?

The point is made that if you use a repeater than you should support it. I agree. But to exclude certain people? Only allow the select few the privilege? This isn't right. By doing this they have in effect torn off a little spectrum meant for all Amateurs and made it their own exclusively.

This is as I understand it, with the full approval of the coordinating committee. If this is not in violation of FCC rules, certainly it is a violation of the spirit of Amateur radio. Maybe a solution is to allow closed systems as long as no one wants the frequency for an open repeater. At that time the closed system would open, or they would loose the sanction. It's only fair. Can you imagine what all the new Amateurs who come to us through no-code are going to think when they're run off repeater after repeater because it's "closed"?

They'll think they could have stayed with CB and gotten that kind of abuse. I don't want you to think that I don't enjoy ham radio, because I certainly do. I've met some very fine people through the hobby and had some great QSO's. I get more enthusiastic about it every day. I want Amateur radio to grow. Not so the Japanese can sell more radios, but to have more people to share this great hobby with.

Next time I want to talk about ground systems. Seems there is a lot of confusion on this subject. Maybe I can answer some questions you've always had on this topic. I'll try.
