The station runs several high shortwave transmitters using elaborate rhombic and curtain antennas to beam their signals into Southeast Asia and Latin America. The station went on the air in November of 1944 and has been in continuous operation since then.



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


MISTAKES!

220 OSCILLATOR STRIP



MORE SATELLITE SCRAMBLING COMING SOON

Scrambling is still big news in the backyard earth station business! Super station, WOR Chicago, is set to scramble full time effective March 1st- although test scrambling could have begun by the time you read this. They will use the M/A-Com VideCipher II system (also adopted by HBO) which seems to be emerging as the standard. HBO was scheduled to scramble their signals on January 15th. Showtime, TBS (Turner Broadcasting Sytem) which includes CNN (Cable News Network) and many others are also set to encode their programming. The Justice Department is in-

Mount Sutro: Evolution of a tower

On February 21st, 1986 the Mount Sutro television tower will be 15 years old. The planning for the tower, however, began in 1956 when ABC first applied to the FCC for approval to build a tall tower on Mount Sutro overlooking the city by the bay. The final authorization for construction of the tower came in February 1966 when the San Francisco Planning Commission approved a conditional use permit for the site.

Before the erection of Sutro Tower, TV broadcasting in San Francisco originated in three locations. During the formative days in the late 1940's, as licenses were issued, stations opted transmitting different sites. KPIX Channel broadcasted from the top of the Mark Hopkins Hotel on Nob Hill. KGO-TV Channel 7 chose Mount Sutro and KRON-TV Channel 4 selected Mount San Bruno, 3 1/2 miles south of the city. KSAN-TV, a UHF pioneer, joined KGD-TV on Mount Sutro. KOVR Channel

13 (Stockton) erected their transmitting site on Mt. Diablo east of San Francisco that covered the Sacramento Valley and the bay area.

It was apparent from the beginning that a common tower would offer advantages to all area broadcasters. problems encountered The location and owner-Two sites were under consideration, Mount Sutro and Mount Bruno. The latter was finally ruled out because of its proximity to the San Francisco International Airport. The ownership problem was solved with the formation of a corporation consisting of ABC, Westinghouse, Cox Broadcasting and Chronicle Broadcasting. Experts from the four com-panies joined consultants, engineers and designers from many disciplines in phases of the project.

Construction began in late February 1971 with footings cut into the undisturbed

rock of the mountain. Grade beams were channeled to connect the three legs to prevent seismic shifting. After the footings were dug, 56 feet square and 10 feet thick, the concrete pouring presented a logistical problem. Ten yard trucks, pouring every few minutes for 24 hours, contributed 1100 cubic yards of concrete for each footing. The foundations, each a 14-foot cube, were then poured for each of the footings with the grade beams poured last .

The raising of the steel presented major problems. The erection of the first 300' of the 977 foot structure went without incident with the steel members raised by a ground-based crane. Above 300 feet a special basket-boom was fabricated which swung from leg to leg within the center the three legs of the tower. Support of the basket was by a series of cables attached to the legs. After the boom was in place (a major accomplishment cause of its 300-foot length) construction resumed at an accelerated pace. When ground crews lost visual with those aloft contact because of the famous San Francisco fog, radio contact kept work flowing. Wind was greatest hazard as the

height increased. There are times at Sutro when you can enjoy calm at ground level and experience 40 mph winds a few hundred feet in the air. Also, there are times when the ground level is fogbound and it is clear and sunny above.

Steel was supplied by

Sutro Tower statistics

- Overall height is 977 feet.
- •Height above sea level is 1811 (AMSL).
- •It is the highest structure in San Francisco.
- •It is only a few feet shorter than the Elffel Tower.
- There is three times as much weight, in concrete, below ground, as the weight of steel above ground. The center of gravity is 13 feet below ground.
- •Steel, all domestic, weighs 3,400,000 pounds. The antennas add another 200,000 pounds.
- There are more than 25,000 feet of transmission line, all copper coax.
- Total cost including tower, building and antennas was in excess of \$12 million. Today's cost would exceed \$50 million.

U.S. Steel and Bethlehem Steel with the finished members shipped by rail flatcar to San Francisco and trucked to the site. The whole thing went togeter like a

giant erector set. The trusses were assembled on the gound and raised as a single unit. There was little welding on site, because everything was bolted together. Almost everything exposed to the weather was hot-dipped galvanized, and all other members were coated with rust- inhibiting paint. With the exception of touch-up work, there has been only one major paint job in the 15 years the tower has been in operation. The topping off of the contruction began in December of 1972 and the antennas were installed. Antennas for channels 2-4-5-7-9-32-44 along with four FM stations were set in place. Channel 4 and 5 share a common antenna with filters keeping interaction to a minimum. The four FM stations, KGO-FM, KFOG, KOIT and KQAK are located at and below the sixth level while the TV stations occupy the stacks above the sixth level. All communication and microwave systems are located at the fourth level, two down from the narrowest part of the tower. While the tower was being built the transmission building adjacent to the base of tower was being

constructed. The building incorporates the south leg of the tower within the building itself so that transmission lines can directly enter the tower/building.

On July 4, 1973, by mutual agreement, all of the stations began transmitting from the highest structure in San Francisco, the new \$12 million Sutro Tower Tower. (Thanks Don Lincoln, Director of Engineering, Sutro Tower)

The ARRL advises that you should get a copy of H.R. 3378 and S. 1667 before you contact your Senators and Congressman about this proposed legislation. You should read the editorial in the Feb. 1986 QST. This editorial explains the facts and the rumors about this legislation. You can get a copy of the legislation by sending a large SASE with 73 cents postage to ARRL Information Services, 225 Main Street, Newington, CT Ø6111.

There is now a third party traffic agreement in effect between the United States and 4U1VIC in Vienna.

The ARRL Club Challenge for the 80's will continue through 1986. There will be a transceiver given away in each of the club categories according to size. This program allows an affiliated club to a \$5 check from ARRL for each new ARRL member a club recruits for the League. Any ARRL application form can be used as long as the affiliated clubs 4 digit code number is written on the application form. If you are not an ARRL member contact your affiliated club for information on joining and benefits of membership.

The following ARRL Section Leadership appointments are available to interested ARRL members: Bulletin Manager (recruits and coordinates Official Bulletin Stations); Official Observer Coordinator (recruits Official Observers and helps in monitoring); Public Information Officer (recruits and coordinates Public Information Assistants and works to improve the image of Amateur Radio in the eyes of the public); and Assistant Technical Coordinator (helps answer technical questions and works in solving RFI problems). Amateurs should avoid using the segment 145.8 to 146.0 mHz for FM simplex because this segment is allocated for satellite inputs. The use of FM on the satellites puts an excessive drain on the batteries and it uses a lot of space on the satellite. CW and SSB use much less bandwidth than does FM.

vestigating whether cable operators violated antitrust laws by convincing programmers to scramble. Meanwhile, representatives of the home satellite hardware industry, worried about how scrambling might affect them, are pushing bills in Congress to impose a two year moratorium on scrambling or guarantee home dish scrambled programming at fair prices. Senator Barry Goldwater, K7UGA, is actively involved in making certain that costs are reasonable and the \$400 descrambler boxes are available to the public before total scrambling takes place. Goldwater is also on record as saying that he feels scrambling legislation is premature at this time since adequate competition does not yet exist in programming. It appears that SPACE (the home dish industry lobby group) has not been successful in getting Congress to go along with their wishes to delay satellite scrambling. Cable operators are developing systems which will enable them to charge

private dish owners for programming. Programmers will
scramble their signals before beaming them to the satellite. Cable operators will unscramble them at their
receiving station. Decoder box owners will have their
dishes turned on by electronic authorization downlinked
from the bird with the signal. In 1980, 4,000 home
dishes were sold. In 1985, 12,000 were sold a ""WEEK"
at an average cost of \$2,000 each.

Ther term "condenser" was born in 1745 when a scientist was experimenting with a Leyden jar. He reasoned that the electric charges were "condensed" in the jar. A Leyden jar was the original capacitor consiting of metal foil sheets on the inside and outside of a glass Jar. The foil served as the plates and the glass as the dielectric. A hundred years later, Michael "Faraday" further studied the charactistics of capacitors. Alessandro "Volta" judged a battery by the flash he saw when he touched its wires to his eyelides! Andre Marie "Ampere" showed that when current flowed through a suspended rectangular wire loop, the loop became magnetized and acted like a compass needle and pointed north. George Simon "Ohm" discovered curious mathematical relationships between various electrical components in 1827. Ohm's source of electricty was a set of Leyden jars connected by brass rods. In 1831, Joseph "Henry" discovered that electricty is induced in a conductor as a result of a magnetic field. It led to the discovery of the transformer. (W5YI Report)
