A OSO thru a satellite

I don't know how many of you have ever had a QSO thru a satellite but it is a big thrill. On May 8 1998 I made my first satellite QSO. Being a little nervous at first I enlisted the help of John K6YK, who lives in Stockton. It was decided that the easiest satellite to "work" would be the Russian satellite Radio Sport 12, or RS 12 as it is called.

This satellite orbits the earth in a slightly elliptical orbit allowing the "bird" to be workable for about 10 to 15 minutes on most passes. Because of the nature of the orbits there are sometimes that the bird does not pass over North America at all. A satellite-tracking program for the computer is mandatory to do any bird By Ron Delacy Bee staff writer QSO's Now I had to get the frequencies set in the radio. RS 12 has two uplinks, one being on 15 Meters (21.210-21.250) and the other on 2 Meters (145.910-145.950). The downlink is on 10 Meters (29.410-29.450).

Before I knew it the entrance to Bear Valley Ski resort was in view and we knew something was wrong. Reviewing my notes I knew the turnoff for Black Springs Road (AKA 7N23) was the third left past the 6000 foot marker. 
