Featured Article: It's Harder to Become a Ham Today Than 65 Years Ago

How many times have you heard an old-timer complain that it was harder to become a "real" ham back in the day? You know the type—the ones who roll their eyes at today's newcomers, convinced that the hobby used to be "legitimate" only if you worked harder for it. Well, I am here to say they have got it wrong. Becoming a ham today is much more difficult than it ever was 65 years ago.

I was licensed in 1956. Back then, the process was straightforward. You learned Morse code at a manageable pace (5 words per minute), studied a bit of basic electronics, understood the fundamental concepts of ham radio, and then you took a test. Weeks later, you were issued a Novice class license. But here is the kicker—even with that license in hand, I still didn't feel like I was a "real" ham. It was just the first step.

Fast forward to today. A prospective ham needs to memorize hundreds of questions, all of which have multiple answers, and pass a test to get their

Technician license. That is right, hundreds of questions. And even after they have passed, they are still not really "in" yet. Sure, they have the license, but the real depth of the hobby? That is a whole other world they have only just begun to scratch.

Back in the 1950s, the biggest challenge was simply getting on the air. You could buy a transmitter, build a receiver, set up an antenna, and you were good to go. That was the essence of it—getting your equipment up and running and making those first contacts. The barrier to entry was not too high. If you were motivated, you could get there quickly. And that is what made it exciting—the simplicity of it. You got on the air and learned by doing. No complicated setups. No overwhelm. Just you, your radio, and the airwaves.

Today, it is a whole different ballgame. The moment a new ham gets licensed, they go out and buy a Baofeng or some other handheld radio, strap it to their belt, and look for a local ham club to join. They are hoping to find a group of people who will help them grow in the hobby. But too often, they are met with grumpy old-timers who look down on their inexpensive radios and treat them like they're not "real" hams. The old-timers, who had to figure out everything themselves back in the day, seem unwilling to offer help to newcomers. "Why should I help them?" they think. "I had to learn the hard way and did it on my own."

And so, the newcomer, feeling lost and intimidated, keeps their mouth shut, hoping to pick things up on their own. But instead of a welcoming atmosphere, they are faced with jargon and tech-heavy conversations that might as well be in a foreign language. Digital modes, CW nets, code plugs, ARES, Pactor, MARS, RACES, FT8, PL tones, nodes, remote control via the internet—on and on it goes. The complexity of the hobby has exploded, and the newcomer is expected to just know it all. It is enough to make anyone feel overwhelmed.

By the end of their first meeting, the newbie is likely to feel like they have just been hit by an avalanche of information. They came to explore a hobby they were excited about, but now they are questioning whether they can even keep up. The excitement they felt is quickly replaced with frustration, confusion, and a sense of being out of their depth. Many of them—disheartened and lost—walk away and never return to the hobby.

Here is the thing: it was easier to become a "real" ham decades ago because the path was simpler. There were fewer distractions, fewer options, and fewer hurdles. We learned things gradually, piece by piece, as technology and methods evolved. But today? Newcomers are bombarded with so much information, so many paths to follow, and so many things to figure out all at once. Instead of a gradual, step-by-step learning process, they are thrown into a whirlwind of confusion. The hobby feels less like an adventure and more like a mountain to climb.

I do not want to dismiss the progress that has been made in ham radio, or the new technologies that have come along. But the reality is that becoming a ham today is more than about passing a test, buying a radio, and learning to navigate a sea of confusing tech. It has, unfortunately, become less about mentorship, and more about self-directed learning. For many, it is just too much to handle. The bottom line is this: becoming a ham today is not just about memorizing answers and getting your license. It is about finding a community that's willing to help you, understanding an ever-growing landscape of new technology, and building your skills a little at a time. And, for a lot of newcomers, that journey is just too overwhelming without help.
