The minutes were presented to the membership in the READOUT prior to the meeting. The club approved the minutes unanimously.

Treasurer Scott Johnson, KNGRKY, presented the monthly treasurer's report which included a very generous donation from the "Renaissance Charitable Foundation" in the amount of \$1,500. These funds were temporarily placed in the general fund but will be relocated to the equipment fund at the request of the doner. The club greatly appreciates the generosity of this anonymous doner and all doners supporting the SARA Club. Randy, KF6RJS, made a motion to approve the report, and after a second by John, W6PY, the club approved the Treasurer's report.

Sergeant at Arms Robin, KG6ZYQ, stated there will be a split-the-pot raffle at the break. Also, we will raffle a donated Baofeng H/T and antenna and an "old school" Simpson test meter.

Field Day update

Field Day 2025: May 15, 2025 Update



Vicki and I made a trip up to McClure point on Monday May 5th to do a little recon. First thing we noticed when we got to the gate was there was no one manning the entrance station. The sign says to buy your passes at yodelportal.com/MID.



We copied the QR code and bought a day pass with our credit card. Before we bought it, I called the Merced Irrigation District Parks Division and asked what was going on. They told me they no longer take cash at the gate. (Needless to say, I was a little put out with that since US currency is still legal tender for all transactions in the United States. We're seeing more and more of this.) Sorry, I digressed....

After purchasing the pass, we drove on up to the sites. The lake is looking beautiful! Still not completely full, but higher up than it was last year. Grasses are drying out fast, and they have not cut too much around the campsites. So, we're all going to have to be careful with open flames, etc. As of today, C3 and C4 are the only two campsites open in the loop. They are pretty small, like pop-up camper tent small.

I called MID Parks and Rec. on Monday May 12th to find out more info. Here's what I found out:

- The entrance station will be manned so campers can get their tags for the sites and day use folks can get their passes.
- The entrance station does not take cash anymore (confirmed). You
 must now pay with a credit card. You can pay there or go online to
 purchase your day pass. Just print it out to show them at the gate.
- At the time of this newsletter, there is still no confirmed fireworks show for Saturday June 28th. If there is, there will be an extra \$10

fee charged at the gate on entrance. So, everyone that has reserved spots for the weekend online will need to fork over the extra fee before going in. Day use folks will be charged accordingly (i.e. regular fee, \$10, + the extra \$10 for Saturday. Seniors and Military, \$9 + the extra \$10)

For those interested in current lake conditions as of Thursday May 15, 2025:

- Lake level is 851.30 feet above sea level and rising. This is close to what it was last year at this time.
- 89% of full capacity.
- 916,500-acre feet in storage now with a total capacity of 1,024,600 AF.

Featured Article: Elmers: An Essential Resource in Short Supply

I was young (9 years old) when I became interested in ham radio. I read a book called *The Hardy Boys and The Shortwave Mystery*. Coming home from school, I told my dad that I wanted to be a radio ham. He smiled. I said something to the effect; "Let's go into town and buy the radios and antenna; I want to be on the air this afternoon." Luckily my dad knew a little more about what I wanted to do so he explained the situation a little more clearly and bought me an ARRL License Manual. I learned quite quickly that it was going to be a bit more labor intensive than just buying a radio and turning on the switch. Having said that it was the beginning of a long and satisfying hobby of many decades.

Today's prospective ham can get on the Internet and download all kinds of training material including all the questions and answers that would potentially be presented to an examinee during an FCC ham radio test. The Internet can also provide lots of exciting YouTube videos showing conversations between distant operators talking about exciting activities that can be experienced by those qualified to use the frequency spectrum available to those licensed.

However, what happens to the newly licensed ham today once his FCC ticket is issued? Loaded with all kinds of dreams and expectations, he goes to a local ham radio club meeting, proud of his recent accomplishment and hoping to share that success with other like-minded enthusiasts. Here's where it all goes downhill fast. The old-timers scoff at his cheap handheld radio and refuse to help him program it so it can be used. The experienced hams form their own little cliques and discuss topics unheard of by the "newbie." Many times, he is completely ignored during the whole event. An Elmer is a friend, a teacher, and a mentor. He/she realizes that the modern-day and experienced ham can be involved in a myriad of activities within the service we call "ham radio." In a way I guess my dad was my mentor in a limited sort of way. I learned that getting on the air wasn't just buying stuff and talking.

Today things are much more involved, and the need to have an experienced person to quide someone in the hobby is much greater. An Elmer listens and then suggests based on experience. An Elmer shares the excitement the newly licensed ham is experiencing and helps to foster and build on that excitement. An Elmer initially finds just one area of the hobby that is the primary interest of the new ham and channels his encouragement into that area alone rather than exposing him/her to so many facets of the hobby that they become confused and disheartened early on. An Elmer realizes that there are no dumb questions or statements from the "newbie." Instead, he patiently guides with a smile and coaxes those guestions/statements for how else is one to learn? The Elmer has no need to brag about his/her experience or tenure within the hobby but instead focuses on nurturing the inquisitiveness of his student. Not only does the Elmer program that Baofeng, but he shows his protege how to do it himself. The Elmer is also cautious not to expose his student to too much at first; it can all be quite overwhelming.

Yes, Elmers are an "Essential Resource in Short Supply." I might add that good Elmers are in even more short supply. Are you willing to be an Elmer? What a great resource you could become if you keep thinking about what was said above.
